FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Utah County Residents and Community Leaders, As 2018 started, we were dealing with a Hepatitis A outbreak that had begun in 2017. The particular strain of Hepatitis A was tied to an outbreak in several states and appeared to originate from San Diego, California. The outbreak was limited to mostly homeless, incarcerated and illicit drug using populations. In early 2018, two food preparation workers at area restaurants were found to be working during their infectious periods. Hepatitis A can be transmitted to food through the various efforts in food preparation by infected workers and from the food to the end consumer.

A media campaign regarding potential exposures in these restaurants was launched along with screening and preventative efforts to prevent additional disease cases. Over 4,000 calls were taken from the public. An additional 17,000 individuals completed an online self-assessment to help them determine their risk. Over 1,626 Hepatitis A vaccinations were given by health department staff to potentially exposed individuals.

In addition, we continued our efforts to educate and vaccinate the high-risk homeless, incarcerated and drug using individuals and their contacts in an effort to bring the outbreak under control. Fortunately, no additional cases were linked to the food handlers and the outbreak in our high-risk populations was contained by the end of February.

Challenges with the water quality of Utah Lake continued in 2018 with harmful algae blooms and E. coli contamination. Health concerns for the public due to the harmful algae blooms and E. Coli contamination are likely to continue as agencies and individuals seek ways to reduce the lake's nutrient load and improve the quality of the water in the lake.


For a couple of years, we have been working with Utah County and Wasatch Mental Health to open a small service center in Payson. The Wasatch Mental Health building in East Payson houses the services of our Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) program as well as Vital Records (birth and death certificates) and immunizations. South County citizens now have ready access to these walk-in services much closer to home with the WIC services beginning in October of 2018 and the vital records and immunizations services starting in January of 2019.

With the ongoing nationwide concerns of communicable disease outbreaks of vaccine preventable diseases as well as emerging communicable diseases such as the ebola virus, we look forward to addressing what challenges may come in 2019 while we continue to provide the very best of public health services to help our citizens stay healthy.

Intergenerational Poverty Grant

Utah County Health Department (UCHD) is excited to have received funding for the Parents as Teachers Intergenerational Poverty Grant for the Welcome Baby program. Through the grant Registered Nurses have a goal of doing home visits with 30 families for two years. Families enrolled receive age appropriate education and screening including:

- What to expect as the child grows and develops, starting in pregnancy or at birth, including screenings for early detection of developmental delays so community referrals can be made
- How the parent can be engaged in the child's learning so the child and preschoolers in the family are prepared for success in school
- Help with common parenting problems
- Fun activities to help the child develop language, gross and fine motor skills

Based on feedback received from the general public and business owners, staff working in the division's water quality programs, namely drinking water and onsite wastewater, conducted a thorough review of enforcement regulations and policies. The primary objectives were to find ways to streamline, simplify, and make the permitting processes more "user friendly" overall. Hundreds of hours went into review and implementation process.

Streamlined Permitting Process for Drinking Water/ Onsite Wastewater

Diesel Emission Program

Air quality legislation during 2018 resulted in Utah County creating and implementing a diesel vehicle inspection program. The program was successfully implemented in January, 2019. The existing Utah County ordinance regarding vehicle emissions had to be amended to include a diesel vehicle inspection program. The change required that equipment be updated at all auto repair shops that perform emissions testing throughout the county. Air quality staff also developed a course to train the technicians who would be conducting the diesel emissions testing.

- Adopted an amendment to Regulation #2008-01 regarding the Determination of Ground-Water Table Elevation
- Adopted a Regulation for Tobacco Sales, Licensing and Permitting
- Physician Mark Donaldson joined the Board of Health

Hepatitis A Response 2018

Responded to Hepatitis A cases in 2 food-handlers at two Utah County restaurants, during January 2018. Over 4,000 calls were fielded from the public, with an additional 7,000 individuals completing an online self assessment to determine risk. Over 1,626 Hepatitis A vaccinations given to individuals exposed or determined at risk. No additional cases were linked to the food-handlers.







Fetal Deaths (20 weeks or more gestation)



FRIENDS OF PUBLIC HEALTH

Since 1995, when the first full week of April was declared National Public Health Week (NPHW), communities across the United States have observed NPHW as a time to highlight issues important to improving the health of the public. As part of NPHW, Utah County Health Department and the Board of Health traditionally honor one individual and one organization for their efforts and dedication to the health and welfare of the citizens of Utah County.

The 2018 honorees are Spanish Fork Active and Healthy Communities and Kye Miner.



Spanish Fork Active & Healthy Communities

- Councilman Mike Mendenhall, Susan Chapman, Commissioner Ivie, Commissioner Lee, and Ralph Clegg
- With a growing community of over 37,000 people, Spanish Fork City works hard to ensure a high quality of life for their residents. In 2016, Councilman Mike Mendenhall and Susan Chapman, a city resident, along with the efforts of many partnering agencies created a community board and began the "Spanish Fork Active and Healthy Communities Movement" where residents commit to be more active to improve both their physical and mental health.
- The Board provides resources and links residents to evidence-based health education programs.

- The Active and Healthy Board disseminates valuable health related information which helps promote physical activity, good nutrition, Living Well Workshops, Prevent T2 diabetes classes, Mental health messages and current initiatives like Speak up, opt out, throw out. They utilize a system of social media and city and local resources, to rely information to residents. Their Facebook page has over 1,900 followers and they collaborate with other community pages with over 13,000 followers. They send information in city bill statements and work closely with local schools to utilize their online and information resources. Likewise, their local SF17 television network reaches over 20,000 viewers with these messages.

- One large yearly event is their much anticipated health fair. Aside from providing free screenings at this event and connecting residents to local mental and physical health resources, they also provide music, games, entertainment, food, prizes and fun which has made the event popular with over 600 participants the first year.

- Additionally, the board has been awarded two grants, one from Intermountain Health Care and Utah League of City and Towns, and one through The Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse. Funds for these grants have gone towards SNAP benefits for low income families at local Farmers Markets, four city air quality monitors, Kids Marathon Program, QPR Training, Top-Star program incentive support, outdoor exercise equipment, and much more.

- A major focus area has been on suicide prevention. Due to a suicide rate higher than the state average, Spanish Fork Active and Healthy Communities established a goal to save lives and reduce death by suicide in their community. They have created their own suicide prevention action plan. In the last 2 years they have strengthened suicide prevention efforts by collaborating with the Utah County Health Department to offer QPR trainings that reached over 200 individuals and rising. As well as, recruited and trained 6 community volunteers as QPR instructors.

- Utah House Representative Mike Mckell, also a Spanish Fork resident, stated "The Active and Healthy Movement in Spanish Fork city is unique and cutting edge. It has not only had a positive impact on residents but can serve as a model for how community partners can work together with government agencies on improving the health of the community."

- Because of these efforts and the difference, they have made in the lives of residents, The Utah County Health Department and the Utah County Board of Health would like to recognize "Spanish Fork Active and Healthy Community Board" with the Friend of Public Health Award.

Kye Miner

- Commissioner Ivie, Commissioner Lee, Kye Miner, and Ralph Clegg
- Kye Miner who works for Intermountain Healthcare, consistently goes above and beyond her regular work assignments with her trademark enthusiasm and big smile. She partners with 30 agencies throughout Utah County but doesn't care who is sponsoring a program, she just wants it available to the community. She has partnered with Utah County Health Department (UCHD) for 16 years with Health Promotion, WIC, Nursing, Senior Companions and Foster Grandparents, and Substance Abuse Prevention.

- Health Promotion – Kye is the main supporter of Safe Kids Utah County and provides funding, meeting spaces, meals, volunteers, volunteer recognition, promotes injury prevention events, and maintains the Safe Kids Utah County budget at the Foundation. Kye coordinates screening events with us and refers individuals to our free "Living Well with Chronic Conditions" self-management workshop. Last year while doing prediabetes health screenings in the community, many folks declined as they were already diagnosed with Diabetes. Knowing that Health Promotion formerly had a very successful Living Well with Diabetes class but no longer had funding, she has worked to contract and fund two more work shop series this year. In addition, Kye provides snacks/meals for the classes and a \$10 fruit & vegetable grocery store voucher for those who complete our workshops. Kye's motto is "It's the right thing to do", which generally means going above and beyond her four main health priorities.

- WIC – Kye has provided funding for blood draws which are required to screen moms who donate breast milk to the Breast Milk Bank. She also provided the original funding for the freezer where it is stored.

- Nursing – For the last 15 years, she has funded flu shots for the homeless each Thanksgiving in partnership with Immunizations. She created the Utah County Dental Campaign where she has partnered with the school nurses to provide fluoride teeth varnishing and dental kits for students in 28 Title 1 schools throughout Utah Co. She has given \$2500 to our school nurses which helps them get vision vouchers for students through the VSP program sponsored by the National Association of School Nurses. This program has helped over 567 students receive free vision exams and glasses. She also helps with the Migrant program in the Nebo School District by coordinating volunteer doctors for physicals, underwear, socks, hygiene kits, and books.

- Senior Services - Kye is a long time supporter our Senior Companion program and the Foster Grandparent programs. She arranges training sites, lunches and occasional presenters for our trainings. Kye understands the value of a senior volunteer in our community - she connects the dots between keeping our seniors active and engaged, which improves the quality of life and increases their independence – and that impacts the whole community. Kye is providing pedometers for our "Walking Program" so our seniors can track their steps. Each time we see Kye she asks "Isn't there something I can do for your sweet volunteers?" She truly loves the seniors and wants our volunteers to be successful and have a positive volunteering experience.....heck, Kye wants everyone to be successful!!

- From all of us at Utah County Health Department, we nominate Kye Miner for Friend of Public Health. We could not complete our contracts and programs without Kye's boundless energy, endless collaboration network and knack for finding funding. One county employee said "I don't know how to put Kye into words. She is simply a force to be reckoned with!"
